
GLOSSARY

- 2. AFFECTION-love.
- 3. BISHOP-overseer of a diocese.
- 4. BONFIRE-outdoor fire.
- 5. BOUGH-branch of a tree.
- CELEBRATION-the marking of an occasion or event, especially a joyous one, with ceremony or festivity.
- 7. CENTURY-period of one hundred years.
- 8. CEREMONY-formal act or ritual.
- CHRISTMAS-festival in honor of the birth of Jesus (December 25)
- 10. COURTSHIP-the act, process, or period of courting a woman.
- 11. CUSTOM-usual practice.
- 12. DECORATION-ornament.
- 13. DEFERENCE-act of showing respect.
- 14. DRUID-member of a celtic religious order of priests, soothsayers, judges, poets, etc. in ancient Britain, Ireland, and France influential especially before the celts were christianized.

- 16. ENTHUSIASM-lively interest.
- 17. FESTIVAL-celebration or feast.
- 18. FONDLE-caress.
- 19. GLOVE-hand covering with sheath for each finger.

- 21. HALLOWEEN-eve (Oct. 31) of all saints' day.
- 22. HESSIAN-a native or inhabitant of Hesse.
- 23. HIEROGLYPHIC-egyptian picture-writing.

- HONEYMOON-holiday trip of newly married couple.
- IMMIGRANT-person who comes to a new country.
- 27. IMMORTALITY-endless existence.
- 28. INFERIOR-less good, important, etc.

- 30. KINSMAN-a relative, especially a male relative.

- MOONSTRUCK-disordered in mind or other wise harmfully affected, supposedly by the influence of the moon; crazed; lunatic; dazed.

- 37. PAGAN-worshipper of idols.

- RECOGNITION-identification of something as having been known before or as being of a certain kind.

- 46. SAXON-member of an ancient germanic people that lived in Northern Germany: some saxons invaded and conquered parts of England in the 5th and 6th centuries, A.D.

- 48. SOLSTICE-time in summer (June 21) or winter (Dec. 21) when sun is at its farthest from the equator.

- SUPERSTITION-irrational belief in supernatural.

- 53. TRADITION-handing-down of beliefs, customs, etc. through generations.
- 54. VEIL-a piece of light fabric, as of net or gauze, worn, especially by women, over the face or head or draped from a hat to conceal, protect, or enhance the face.
