
GLOSSARY

- 1. AFFIX-attach.
- 2. AIR FORCE ONE-any plane the president is riding in.
- ALLIANCE-treaty for combination of independent nations.
- 4. AMERICAN EAGLE-the bald eagle of North America.
- 5. APEX-peak
- 6. ARMED FORCES-all the Military, Naval, and Air Forces of a country or group of countries.
- 7. BALD-without hair
- 8. CAMP DAVID-Presidential retreat.
- 9. CLAPPER-object striking a bell.
- CONGRESS-the legislature of the United States, consisting of the Senate and House of Representatives.
- 11. CONTINENT-major land mass.
- 12. DESIGN-to plan.
- 13. DISCOVER-perceive for the first time.
- 14. EMBLEM-symbolic design.
- 15. FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION (F.B.I.)-a branch of the United States Department of Justice whose duty is to investigate and bring to trial all violators of federal criminal laws, except violators of currency, tax, and postal laws.
- FILIBUSTER-a meaningless speech that hinders legislation.
- 17. FOREIGN-belonging to an area outside the country.
- 18. GEOGRAPHER-one who studies the earth or its features.
- GREAT SEAL-the chief seal of a nation, state, etc., with which the official papers are stamped as proof of their approval.
- 20. HOIST-lift.
- 21. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES-a legislative assembly.
- 22. INSCRIBE-write
- LIBERTY BELL-the bell of Independence
 Hall in Philadelphia, rung July 4, 1776 to pro claim the independence of the United States.
- 24. LOUISIANA PURCHASE-the land bought by the United States from France in 1803 extending from the Gulf of Mexico to Canada and from the Mississippi to the Rocky Mountains.

- 25. MAINTAIN-keep in good order.
- 26. MAJESTIC-stately, noble.
- 27. MONUMENT-something built or put up in remembrance.
- 28. NEGOTIATE-establish by bargaining.
- 29. POSTERITY-succeeding or future generations
- 30. PROCESSION-parade.
- 31. PROCLAIM-announce publicly.
- 32. PROVINCIAL-of an administrative district.
- 33. PURCHASE-buy
- 34. PYRAMID-structure or form with triangular sides.
- 35. RELIC-survival from the past.
- 36. RESIDENCE-dwelling place.
- 37. RESOLUTION-formal expression of opinion.
- 38. SCULPTOR-one who creates art in three dimensions.
- SECRET SERVICE-the law-enforcement arm of the treasury department, also responsible for the safety of the President and other government officials.
- 40. SENATE-senior legislative body.
- 41. SEQUOIA-Presidential yacht.
- 42. SETTLEMENT-community of settlers.
- 43. STAFF-a pole for supporting a banner or flag.
- 44. STATUE OF LIBERTY-a bronze statue, over 150 feet high, of a crowned woman, the goddess of liberty, holding a torch in her upraised hand.
- 45. SUPREME COURT-the highest federal court, consisting of nine judges.
- 46. TALON-bird claw.
- 47. TERRITORY-region without full political status.
- 48. UNION-a device symbolizing political union, used in a flag or ensign; it may be placed in the upper inner corner, as the white stars on blue field in the flag of the United States.
- 49. VESTIBULE-antichamber.
- 50. VOYAGE-an extended journey, especially by sea.
- WHITE HOUSE-the official residence of the President of the United States, located in Washington, D.C.

SUGGESTED TEACHING STRATEGIES
